Introduction India



Rhythm Game

Write the verse on the chalk board or large piece of paper. Make sure it is large enough so all can see and read it.

Have children form a circle. Toss a ball or other object from person to person. Each time a person catches the ball they must say the next word of the verse. They can throw the ball to anyone. Do this several times seeing how fast they can say the verse.

If your group is large enough you could form two circles and have a competition between each group for the fastest time, least number of mistakes, best rhythm etc.

Bible Lesson

I Kings 17:1-16

The prophet Elijah told King Ahab that there would be no rain for the next few years. Do you think that was a popular thing for him to say? (No) Why do we need rain? (We need rain so the plants and crops will grow – giving us food to eat, so the rivers and lakes will be full, so animals can live and grow, etc.) King Ahab was likely unhappy with what Elijah told him. Maybe he wanted to hurt Elijah.

God told Elijah to go and hide near the Kerith Brook. What is a brook? A brook is a small river. God told Elijah that he could drink water from the brook and the birds would bring bread and meat to him every morning and night. Isn't it great how God provided for Elijah's needs?

But, verse 7 tells us that "...the brook dried up because of the lack of rain" (TEV). Elijah needed the water from the brook to live. It met his physical needs. What would happen if Elijah had no water for several days? (Elijah would die.) Now what could Elijah do? Do you think he panicked or became angry? Maybe. But, Elijah knew that God would take care of him. And He did.

Verse 8 tells us that God told Elijah to go to the town gate in Zerephath. God had already prepared a woman to provide for him. When Elijah got to the city, he saw a widow collecting firewood. He asked her for a drink and a piece of bread.

Read verses 12-14 as a class. Have the children retell the conversation that Elijah had with the widow.

The Bible tells us that the widow obeyed Elijah and did exactly as he told her. And, just like Elijah promised, her bowl never ran out of flour and the jar never ran out of oil.

Sometimes we are in situations where things look hopeless. Maybe we even think that God has forgotten us. But, look at the story of Elijah. He had to hide from King Ahab. The water that God gave him to drink dried up. And the widow only had enough flour for one more meal. All of those things could have made Elijah very sad and scared.

But, God took care of Elijah - just like He will always take care of you and me.


Battle of Knowledge

Game of wits, skill and good aim. (Team play)

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Materials:

Masking tape
Small bean bag or rolled-up sock
1 piece of red construction paper
1 piece of black construction paper
16 review questions







15 minutes



Preparation:

Before class, create 16 review questions. Cut out eight red circles and eight black circles. Take the masking tape and create a sixteen-sectioned grid on the floor. The grid should be four sections wide by four sections deep (see example above). Each section should be equal in size. Divide the children up into two teams.



What you will do:

To win the game, you must get four circles in a row for your team. Have person stand 2 meters from box. Taking turns, each team throws the beanbag or sock into an unoccupied square and then gets a chance to answer a question. If they do not land in an unoccupied square they lose their turn.



If the throwing team answers the question correctly, they get to put one of their circles in that square. If the throwing team answers incorrectly, the other team gets a chance to answer the same question. If the other team answers correctly, they get to put one of their circles in the square. Once a circle is in a square, it cannot be removed. Members of each teams can work together to answer the question, but each team member must take a turn throwing the beanbag or sock. If neither team gets four in a row, the game is a draw.









Pray for the children of our country which makes up 40% of the total population. Most of the population live in rural area.


Pray for the children those who do not go school, that they may get the opportunity to grow and learn.

Mine Field

This game teaches kids the value of communication and trust. It works best if you have a large area, indoor or outdoor.

Set up a series of obstacles (chairs, tables, balls, etc), creating a mock mine filed.

Ask the group to pair off in groups of two. One person is blind folded and must make their way through the 'mine field' by listening to their partner. Their partner verbally talks them through but cannot enter the mine field. If the person hits a 'mine lose their turn and another group beings. After everyone has gone through, swap roles.

At the end of the game, talk about what they learned about communication and trust.

- what was helpful communication and what wasn't?
- was it easy to trust your guide?
- what were some of their feelings fear, safety, etc?
- was it easier going first or last team?

Discuss the importance of effective communication and team work in sharing about Jesus.
